Tutors notes:

- There are seven days in a week.
- When we say 'days of the week' we are talking about all seven days – Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday.
- When we say 'weekdays' we are only talking about the five days from Monday to Friday – Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday.
- When we say the 'weekend' we are talking about Saturday and Sunday.
- Days are **always** capitalised:

- February is a special month – it usually has 28 days but every four years it has 29 days – We call this fourth year a ‘leap year’, and the extra day a ‘leap day’.

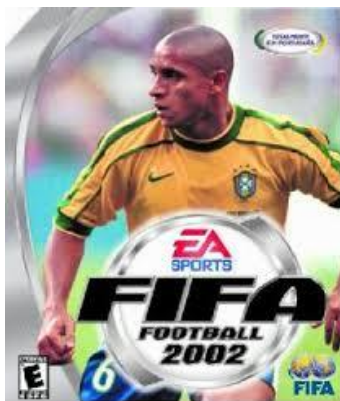

Years and Dates

- From 2000 onwards, years are pronounced like ordinary cardinal numbers:
- 2000 – ‘two thousand’
- 2003 – ‘two thousand and three’
- Earlier years are pronounced differently: the first two figures are a number and the last two figures are a number. They can be joined by hundred and, which is only necessary, however, if the last two figures are 00 through 09.
- 1999 - nineteen (hundred and) ninety-nine
- 1806 - eighteen hundred and six / eighteen oh six
- If you want to give the year without an exact date, use the preposition **in**:
- I was born in 1972.

Tutor notes: Rules for telling the time in English:

- In English we use the word "past" to say times after the hour until half past, or 30 minutes past the hour.
- We use "to" to say times before the hour from 31 minutes until the full hour.
- In English we use o'clock only at the full hour. Example: It's eight o'clock
- We can also just say the numbers in groups of two. Example: It's seven twenty-five
- When speaking about the different times of the day we often use: in the morning, in the afternoon, in the evening
- Be careful! In English we say 'at night' NOT 'in the night'

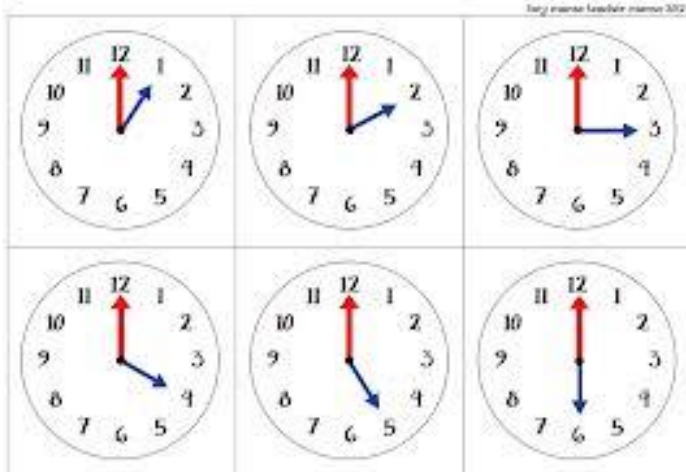

Simple Prepositions

Tutor notes: What is a preposition?

A preposition is a word that shows the relationship between a noun (a word that names a person, a place, a thing or an idea) or a pronoun (a word that takes the place of a noun for subject, object, or possessive cases) *and* another word in the sentence.

For example, in the sentence, "My *dog* is **on** the *bed*," the word "*on*" is the preposition; it shows the relationship between **the dog** and **the bed**. One way to think of prepositions is to remember that they indicate **location**. If we change the preposition, we change where the dog is, in relation to the bed!

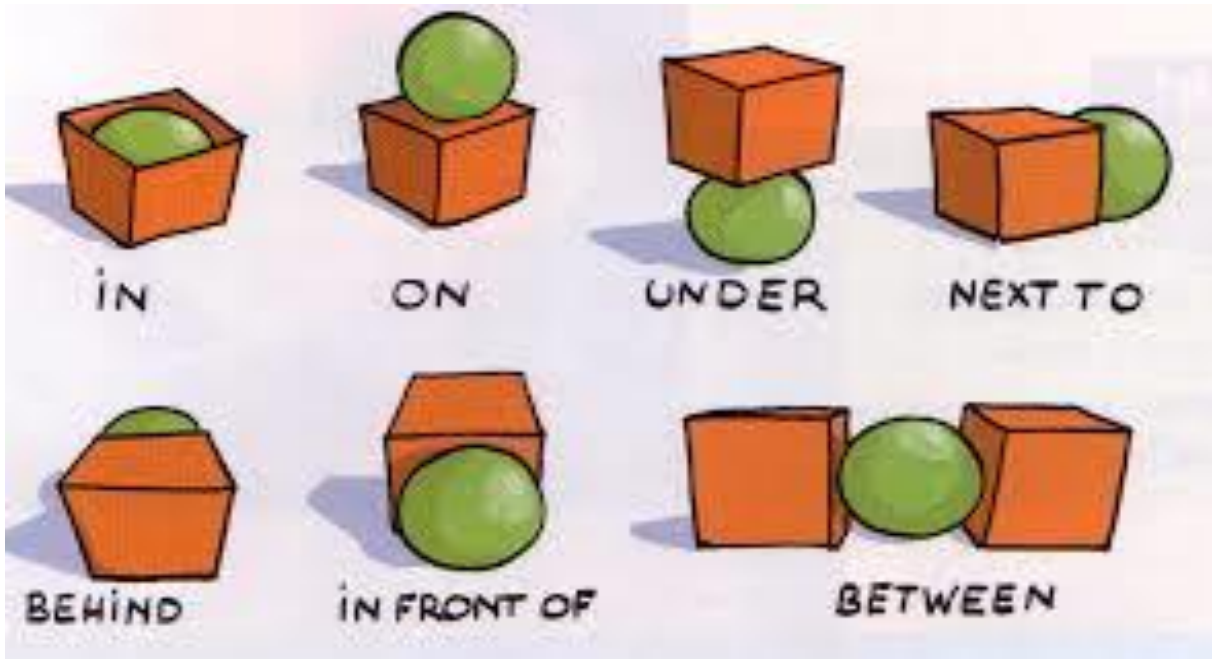
